CLA Engineers was retained by David and Melissa Baribault to prepare planting plan for 33 High Point Drive to mitigate impacts of recent tree cutting within the conservation easement on the referenced property. The conservation easement was established as part of the subdivision and is shown on the attached sketch/planting plan that is based on the original subdivision plan (refer to attached sketch). CLA also understands that the planting plan should include evergreens planted between the shed and the Connecticut River in order to screen the view from the river. The planting schedule is included as Appendix A

The plantings listed in Appendix A are all species that are native to Connecticut and adapted to the soil and sunlight conditions at the site. The owners proposed a one to one replacement for the tress that were cut (six in total) and in addition the 4 red cedar trees to provide a visual screen. Highbush blueberry shrubs are included to enhance the wildlife habitat value and aesthetics.

The plants should be planted under the supervision of a landscaper or soil scientist.
