The Town is also pressing ahead to improve the water situation in the Village Center in order to address growing needs in and around that area and to allow for appropriate expansion to other areas. Staff and the



# **Summer Sign Up for Lake-Smart Award Evaluation**

Summer is a great time to do improvements to your lake or watershed property in order to have a cleaner Lake Pocotopaug. It is also a time to have your property evaluated and earn a Lake Smart Award.

The East Hampton Conservation-Lake Commission (CLC) started the "Lake-Smart Award Program" for property owners living on Lake Pocotopaug or in the surrounding watershed. The purpose is to encourage property owners to improve the quality of Lake Pocotopaug by doing projects to prevent infiltration of phosphates, nitrates, pesticides,

and other impurities from entering the lake. Those that achieve seven requirements will receive a Lake-Smart Award sign they can display on their property. It is hoped the program will not only improve the quality of the lake but also encourage neighbors to make improvements to their property,

Congratulations to these other families in the Lake Pocotopaug Water Shed who have previously received the "Lake-Smart Award." Pam Joslyn and Gary Greenwald of Hale Road, John Roche Family and Ellen Braun Family both on Raymond Road, Cap & Craig Nelson on Lakewood Road, Don Burr on Bay Road, Lori Wilcox of Hawthorne Road, and Gladys Yeager, owner of The Happiest Paddler/West Shore Marine.

Some of the seven criteria property owners will be evaluated on are: do they have a "buffer zone," rain gardens, diversion ditches, etc. that contain stormwater runoff before it reaches the lake? Do owners refrain from using chemical fertilizers containing phosphates and nitrates or using pesticides and herbicides?

Those wishing to be evaluated for the award should contact: Jeremy Hall of the Parks & Recreation Dept. (860-267-7300 or jhall@easthamptonct.gov) or Jeremy DeCarli of the Planning & Zoning Dept. (860-267-7450 or jdecarli@easthamptonct.gov) or any members of the CLC. An appointment will be arranged for a CLC member(s) to visit the owners and help them evaluate their property. If there is a deficiency, owners will be given suggestions on improving their property. If they achieve all the goals, they will receive a Lake-Smart Award.

In order to help property owners living on the lake or in the surrounding watershed to achieve the seven requirements, The Friends of Lake Pocotopaug are sponsoring a Lake-Smart Award Program of free grants of up to \$150 to help property owners complete projects to achieve the Lake-Smart Award. # East Hampton Volunteer Fire Department — It's ELECTRIC!!!

The Fire Service can get charged up about a lot of things, and one of the most recent topics energizing firefighters across the country is the subject of electrically-powered vehicles (EV). Hybrid and electric vehicles in garages, driveways and on roadways are becoming increasingly more popular as environmental concerns and governmental regulation drive consumers away from dependence on fossil fuels. Rapidly advancing technologies enable manufacturers to produce EV's that are quiet, clean and incorporate the same capabilities, features and amenities as their gasoline or diesel-powered brethren. The big difference between the two, obviously, is the source of the

power needed to propel the vehicle to its destination.

EV's are propelled by an electric motor that converts electrical energy into torque. Determined early on in development that connecting EV's to 200-mile-long extension cords to be somewhat impractical, the electrical energy for an EV needed to be self-contained within the vehicle itself and be of sufficient voltage and amperage to generate the required torque. To accomplish this task, engineers arrange a number of "cells" in series to create groups of "modules" that, when connected to each other, form a rechargeable battery "pack" that can be incorporated into the design of the vehicle.



The most common EV "cell" is lithium-based and the number of "cells" in each "module" and the number of "modules" connected together will determine the output and duration of the energy stored in the "battery pack". A fully charged lithium-ion "cell" produces about 3.7 volts of electrical output and, depending on the make and model, an EV requires between 300 and 400 volts to operate. A battery pack at full charge can produce up to 75 kWh (kilowatt hours), enough energy to power an average home for two and a half days. Most often, the battery pack in an EV is mounted within the chassis of the vehicle, under the floorboards of the entire passenger compartment, and forms an integral part of the vehicle's structure.

Battery packs in EV's and other Energy Storage Systems (as in some solar panel array installations) present unique challenges to firefighters when those packs are breached or damaged. Damage incurred in motor vehicle accidents, by road hazards, punctures or other events can cause heat to build up rapidly inside the compromised battery cells and spread to surrounding cells in a cascade-like process called thermal runaway. Thermal runaway can lead to arc flashing of the electrical components, the off gassing of toxic chemicals, and sometimes explosions as the cells continue to produce power but the stranded energy has nowhere to go. Thermal runaway causes fires that are extremely difficult to extinguish, requiring copious amounts of water to be continuously applied until the stored energy completely dissipates.

Fire Chief Greg Voelker recently incorporated an extensive section on EV incidents into the Department's annual HazMat training for all East Hampton volunteer firefighters. "As EV's and battery storage installations in homes with solar panels become more numerous, it's important that our firefighters, and our residents in general, not only understand the risks involved with these types of energized systems but also know what to do if something bad happens. Electrocution, toxic chemicals, fire, explosion are all part of the equation balance and, while we all enjoy the benefits of these evolving technologies, we also need to be aware of their perils, too."

# Office of the Assessor

# **Real Estate Change of Mailing Address**

The Office of the Assessor is responsible for all Real Estate mailing addresses. Once a mailing address is updated in our office the change is updated in the Collector of Revenue's Office for tax and/or sewer billing. If you recently changed your mailing address, please visit our office or our Change of Address Form on the Assessor's page of our website at: www.easthamptonct.gov/assessor

Additionally, give us a call just to confirm your mailing address. Quite often, tax bills are sent to mortgage companies. To receive additional mail from the Town an address update might be needed. This is especially true for post office box holders in the Middle Haddam and Cobalt sections of East Hampton.

#### **Veterans**

All property owners claiming exemption due to military service must file their DD214 form with the Town Clerk by September 30, 2022. Veterans claiming disability exemption must submit proof from the Veterans Administration.

# Elderly and Totally Disabled Renter's Rebate Program

Residents 65 years of age or totally disabled may be eligible for a rent rebate under CT State law within the Municipality where they currently reside; income guidelines apply and are adjusted each year. Must be filed on or before October 1, 2022 with the Assessor's Office.

Per the State of CT Office of Policy and Management for the 2021 Benefit Year, the maximum income for a single taxpayer was set at \$38,100. The maximum income for a married couple was set at \$46,400. Additionally, the applicant must have lived in CT for one year.

## Public Act 490

All applications for classification of farm or forestland must be received by October 31, 2022.

# **Motor Vehicle Requirements**

If you no longer own a motor vehicle and have cancelled the registration at DMV, please bring the DMV plate receipt and one of the following forms of proof in order to

receive a tax credit. The documentation must have the VIN# and all the corroborating information.

A. A copy of the bill of sale.

B. A copy of the transfer of title (i.e., receipt from junkyard, trade-in paperwork, donation receipt).

C. A copy of the original registration issued to the person to whom you sold the vehicle.

D. A copy of the registration in another state.

E. Documentation from an insurance company, i.e.; payment for a stolen vehicle, payment for a totaled vehicle, cancellation of coverage due to sale of vehicle.

The assessor's office may require a combination of additional information or verification of the preceding items, as necessary, for the removal or crediting of a motor vehicle assessment.

Unregistered vehicles still owned and located in East Hampton will remain on the grand list as personal property.

# **Town Clerk's Office**

JUNE IS DOG LICENSE MONTH! All dogs 6 months or older must be licensed each year in the town where they reside. A current rabies certificate is required for all dogs, and a neutered/ spayed certificate is required for dogs that will be licensed for the first time.

Dog License Fees - Neutered Male/Spayed Female \$8, Male/ Female \$19, Kennel Licenses (10) \$50 plus .10 per tag (20) \$100 plus .10 per tag, Late licensing penalty \$1 per month after June, and .50 to replace a lost tag.

Dog licenses may be obtained at the Town Clerk's Office Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday, 8:00 am to 4:00 pm, Tuesday, 8:00 am to 6:30 pm and Friday, 8:00 am to 12:30 pm or by mail. If applying by mail, include a check for the proper fee, made payable to the East Hampton Town Clerk, all certificates, and a self-addressed stamped envelope. Please send all mail requests to the Town Clerk, Town Hall, 1 Community Drive, East Hampton, CT 06424. All certificates required will be returned with the new license and tag.

RENEWALS ONLY can be completed online through the Town Clerk's dog renewal system. To renew online you must have a current rabies certificate on file with the Town Clerk's Office. # **Fireworks Safety**

With the Fourth of July around the corner, it is very important to have an understanding of fireworks in regard to what is allowed and not allowed in order to protect you and those around you from pain, injury, or unexpected fires.

Below are some Fireworks Safety Tips:

- Never allow children to play with or ignite fireworks
- Never try to re-light or pick up fireworks that have not ignited fully
- Keep a bucket of water or a garden hose handy in case of fire or other mishaps
- Make sure fireworks are legal in your area before buying or using them
- Avoid using alcohol while handling fireworks
- The safest way to enjoy fireworks is to attend a public display by a licensed professional.

# What is legal in Connecticut

"Sparklers" means a wire or stick coated with pyrotechnic composition that produces a shower of sparks upon ignition. "Fountain" means any cardboard or heavy paper cone or cylindrical tube contacting pyrotechnic mixture that upon ignition produces a shower of colored sparks or smoke. "Fountain" includes, but is not limited to, (A) a spike fountain, which provides a spike for insertion into the ground, (B) a base fountain which has a wooden or plastic base for placing on the ground, or (C) a handle fountain which is a handheld device with a wooden or cardboard handle.

Must be 16 years of age or older to legally use sparklers or fountains.

Sun and Fun Camp is an eight-week day camp based out of Center School and Sears Park. Center School will house us for drop off on most days. Campers will be bussed or walk to Sears Park or other areas in town for additional activities. Pickup location may be at either Center School or Sears Park depending on the activities planned for that day.

Much like the Sears Park Summer camp that a lot of campers are used to, activities such as crafts, sports, and games are offered each week. Each week there will be a special theme, field trip, or special guest. Swimming is fully supervised by our ARC Certified Lifeguards and camp staff. The camp staff is CPR/First Aid Certified. Everything should be labeled with the camper's name. A backpack is recommended. Please leave all electronics at home.

# **Protecting Our Water Resources**

As the flowers bloom and your attention is focused on your yard, there are a few things to keep in mind to protect the watercourses, waterbodies, and wetlands throughout East Hampton.

- 1. Leaves and Debris- Don't rake or blow your leaves into any waterbody, watercourse, or wetland. Although it seems like an easy way to get rid of the unwanted leaves from your lawn, these leaves add nutrients and undue stress on the ecosystem. Although some leaf debris is natural, the concentration from the yard is an unnatural burden. Dispose of leaves at the transfer station or in a location where they can be kept from entering the water. In addition, don't put leaves in the street; they will run to the nearest catch basin and directly drop into a nearby waterway.
- 2. Grass Clippings Just like leaves, grass clippings can make the journey downstream and provide unwanted nutrients to waterbodies. Using a mulching blade can help the lawn absorb the nutrients from the clippings and act as a free fertilizer. However, if you don't have a mulching blade, dispose of the clippings properly and away from waterbodies and wetlands.

- 3. Fertilizers If fertilizing your lawn, be sure to minimize the amount used. Excess fertilizer not taken up by your grass washes downstream during rain events and contributes to nutrient loading. It's best to have the soil tested to determine what the lawn may need rather than applying a general fertilizer.
- 4. Pets Pet waste gets washed away with rain over time and carries nutrients to any nearby watercourse. Cleaning up after your pet can help to reduce nutrient loading.
- 5. Car Washing If you live near any waterbody or wetland, think twice before washing your car in your driveway, especially if it is paved. Most soaps contain both nitrogen and phosphorous. These nutrients contribute to algae growth.
- 6. Natural Buffers A natural buffer of trees and shrubs between your lawn and the nearby water or wetland is an important part of filtering out sediments and nutrients. Keeping these areas intact can help to protect that resource.

Remember, any projects resulting in soil disturbance near wetlands or waterbodies may require a permit. Please contact our office before beginning your next summer project.

# **Summer Safety Around Campfires**

Sitting under the stars by a crackling fire has its appeal. It's where stories are told, sing-a-longs happen, and meals are cooked over an open flame. Campfires bring family and friends together. But campfire mishaps can cause injuries. With a few safety tips, you can prevent these accidents.

## SAFETY AROUND THE FIRE


- Before setting up a campfire, be sure it is permitted. Check with your local fire department.
- Care shall be taken while consuming alcoholic beverages around a campfire. In the past several years we have had individuals who have gone to the Bridgeport Burn Unit due alcohol related injuries around a campfire.
- If campfires are permitted, they need to be at least 25 feet away from any structure and anything that can burn.
- Clear away dry leaves and sticks, overhanging low branches and shrubs.
- Avoid burning on windy, dry days. It is easier for open burning to spread out of control when it is windy and dry.
- Watch children while the fire is burning. Never let children or pets play or stand too close to the fire.

- Attend to the campfire at all times. A campfire left alone for only a few minutes can grow into a damaging fire.
- Keep a campfire small which is easier to control.



- Never use gasoline or other flammable or combustible liquids.
- Always have a hose, bucket of water, or shovel and dirt or sand nearby to put out the fire. Make sure to put it completely out before leaving the site.
- If your clothes catch fire, stop, drop, and roll. Stop, drop to the ground and cover your face with your hands. Roll over and over or back and forth until the fire is out.
- Treat a burn right away. Cool the burn with cool water for 3 to 5 minutes. Cover with a clean, dry cloth. Get medical help if needed.
   FACT: Campfire accidents send thousands of people to emergency rooms with burn injuries every year.
