Hello East Hampton,

Fall is right around the corner and I am sure we are all hoping that the Town, State and Country are getting to a better situation quickly. It has certainly been difficult and trying times since March 2020. Despite the recent setbacks, we had a pretty great summer filled with lots of outdoor activities. Whether through the Recreation Depart-



ment, the Library or the Senior Center, residents were participating in programs and activities at rates higher than they have ever been. Plus, as a community, we borrowed over 100,000 items in one year from our Library for the first time ever! As we don masks, get vaccinated and take other safety precautions, I hope we continue to engage and move forward into the fall and winter.

This fall, work will commence on the athletic fields at the High School including projects to improve the tennis courts, baseball field, track and soccer field. Based on the approval granted by the Town Meeting earlier this year, the nearly \$1.1 million project will be funded with unspent proceeds for the High School renovation project. Additionally, the Town is selecting an engineering firm to

assist it with identifying and developing one or more new water sources for the Town's water system as well as to work with the Town to develop the long-term plans for improving service in and around the Village Center as well as adjoining areas to address water quality and water quantity needs. With previously received

grant funds, American Rescue Plan funds and, perhaps, other infrastructure funding from outside of East Hampton, we may be in a unique position to move appropriate plans forward.

off students with the start of the new school year. Motorists are required to stop for a school bus whenever the flashing red signal lights are displayed. Motorists who fail to stop can be issued an Infraction for 14-279, which carries a fine of \$470.00 dollars.

The Town of East Hampton, like other towns, is not immune to the occasional rash of car burglaries or stolen vehicles that are often committed by juveniles. Prevention efforts on the part of residents can help prevent future incidents. In almost all the cases in which the vehicles were entered, the vehicle was left unlocked. In cases in which the car was stolen, the keys were left in the vehicle. Please remove the keys from your vehicle, lock all doors and remove valuables from plain sight. DO NOT attempt to intervene if you see someone attempting to break into your vehicle, these individuals are now resorting to violence when confronted. PLEASE just dial 911. ## **Lake-Smart Award Evaluation**

The East Hampton Conservation & Lake Commission (C&LC) started the" Lake-Smart Award Program" for property owners living on Lake Pocotopaug or in the surrounding watershed. The purpose is to encourage property owners to improve the quality of Lake Pocotopaug by doing projects to prevent infiltration of phosphates, nitrates, pesticides, and other impurities from entering the lake. Those that achieve seven requirements will receive a Lake-Smart Award sign they can display on their property. It is hoped the program will not only improve the quality of the lake but also encourage neighbors to make improvements to their property,

Congratulations to these other families in the Lake Pocotopaug Water Shed who have received the "Lake-Smart Award" in 2020: Pam Joslyn and Gary Greenwald of Hale Road, John Roche Family and Ellen Braun Family both on Raymond Road, Cap & Craig Nelson on Lakewood Road, and Lynn & Marty Podskoch on O'Neill Lane.

Some of the seven criteria property owners will be evaluated on are do they have a "buffer zone," rain gardens, diversion ditches, etc. that contain stormwater runoff before it reaches the lake. Do owners refrain from using chemical fertilizers containing phosphates and nitrates or using pesticides and herbicides. In mowing their lawn do they maintain the level of their lawn at 2 1/2-3" and use a mulching blade instead of bagging grass clippings. Do they cover bare soil areas with mulch or plantings. Do they refrain from feeding water fowl and discourage them from coming onto their property. Finally, do they prevent leaves and grass clippings from entering the lake.

or any members of the C&LC. An appointment will be arranged for a C&LC member(s) to visit the owners and help them evaluate their property. If there is a deficiency, owners will be given suggestions on improving their property. If they achieve all the goals, they will receive a Lake-Smart Award. We can all work together to have a cleaner lake.

## **Thanksgiving Safety**

The East Hampton Fire Marshal wants to stress the importance of safety in the kitchen this Thanksgiving holiday. There is a lot of activities & commotion within the kitchen on this holiday, so practice these safety tips to have a fun and safe Thanksgiving.

- Always keep an eye on your food so stay in proximity of your cooking area.
- Frequently check on the food while cooking and NEVER leave the home when cooking.

- Children should be kept at least 3 feet from the stove.
- Ensure the children stay away from not only the stove but hot food
- Keep a clean working area to ensure no tripping accidents occur
- · Always keep knives in a safe locationespecially away from children
- Electric cords should not be reachable by children and should remain untangled

## **Land Use Department**

Land Use Department has begun a planning effort to improve the Village Center and create bike and pedestrian friendly connections throughout the area. With the Air Line Trail State Park running through the Village Center, bike and pedestrian infrastructure is a necessary component of this plan.

The goal of this project is to encourage walkability in the Village Center, create pedestrian and bike friendly connectivity, and create an overall attractive space where residents and visitors alike want to stop and spend time. Some preliminary ideas include general streetscape improvements, wayfinding, additional public gathering spaces, and the incorporation of cultural and historical elements to add to the aesthetic of the Village Center.

As of now preliminary research has taken place, as well as meetings with the business owners from the Village Center to gain valuable insight. An inventory of existing conditions has been started in the Village Center focusing on current infrastructure, such as crosswalks, sidewalks, bike racks, trash, and recycling receptacles, parking, open space, and signage. These elements were some of those addressed by the business owners and found as valuable and necessary components to the aesthetic, and functionality of the Village Center.

On August 3, the department held a planning event attended by about 15 residents where we were able to gain valuable insight. A draft plan is currently in the works and is scheduled to be made public around Labor Day. Final comments will be received, and the final plan should be completed by late September.

This project is being led by our intern, Chris Roberts, a recent CCSU Planning program graduate and is funded through a grant from the Connecticut Chapter of the American Planning Association.




## 2021 East Hampton & Portland Electric Car Show

REMINDER - All dogs over six months were to be licensed by the 30th of June. A one-dollar fee will be charged for each month late.

Dog licenses may be obtained at the Town Clerk's Office Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday, 8:00 am to 4:00 pm, Tuesday, 8:00 am to 6:30 pm and Friday, 8:00 am to 12:30 pm, by mail or online. If applying by mail please include a check for the proper fee made payable to the East Hampton Town Clerk, all certificates, and a selfaddressed stamped envelope, and mail to Town Clerk, Town Hall, 1 Community Drive, East Hampton, CT 06424. To renew online you



must have a current rabies certificate on file with the Town Clerk's Office. You can access the on-line dog renewal system at www.easthamptonct.gov/ town-clerk/pages/dog-licenses

#### **Energy Assistance**

Please contact Christine at (860) 267-4468 ext. 3208 to coordinate your 2021/2022 winter energy assistance application to apply for this program. We are still following COVID precautions, and the application process is being conducted mainly over the phone. Processing by CRT may take up to 45 business days, so please factor that in when planning. This program is to assist with your primary heating source, and any funds that you qualify for become available for use in November. Please call/email (cwiesner@easthamptonct.gov) to acquire the list of required documents needed to determine your eligibility. Do not wait until you are out of fuel! In the event you are approved for energy assistance, and are in need of a delivery, it is best to request your delivery 5-7 business days before you will be in need of the fuel. This ensures enough time for the request to get to your approved vendor and for them to deliver to your home in a timely manner.

East Hampton Social Services continues to assist residents with applications and renewals for DSS services. If you are in need of assistance with either, please call us to discuss. Most of these we can help with remotely.

Eversource: If you are struggling to keep up with your electric bill, contact us and we can help to find what options may be available to your household.

Residents who are struggling financially, short-term or long-term are encouraged to contact Social Services to discuss resources and options that may be available. We recommend residents contact us as soon as they feel a need. All information disclosed is handled with confidentiality.

## Office of the Collector of Revenue

#### **Change of Address**

It is import that the Tax Office has your current mailing address to ensure that you receive your bill in a timely manner. You may change your real estate mailing address by filling out a "Change of Address Form" located on our website at www.easthamptonct.gov. For a motor vehicle change of address please visit the DMV website at www. ct.gov/dmv. Connecticut law requires all Connecticut residents with a vehicle registration, driver's license, or non-driver identification card to notify the DMV within 48 hours of any change of address.

#### A Reminder

There is not an additional mailing for the second installment of taxes due in January. Please use your payment voucher that was included with your July tax bill. If you have misplaced your bill you may look it up by visiting www.easthamptonct.gov or contact the Tax Office at (860) 267-2300.

#### Office of the Assessor

In accordance with Connecticut General Statute 12-40, all persons who are liable to pay taxes on tangible personal property belonging to them on October 1, 2021, must file a declaration of their personal property on or before Monday, November 1, 2021, with the Assessor, or be subject to an estimated assessment and the statutory 25% penalty. Various exemptions are explained on the declaration and available if filed on time.

#### NO DECLARATION IS REQUIRED FOR MOTOR VEHICLES REGISTERED IN EAST HAMPTON, CT

#### NO DECLARATION IS REQUIRED FOR REAL ESTATE

Personal property includes, but is not limited to, non-CT registered motor vehicles, unregistered motor vehicles (including junk autos), campers, all business machinery, equipment, tools, commercial furniture and fixtures.

If you no longer own a motor vehicle and have cancelled the registration at DMV, please bring the DMV plate receipt and one of the following forms of proof in order to receive a tax credit. The documentation must have the VIN# and all the corroborating information.

UNREGISTERED VEHICLES STILL OWNED AND LOCATED IN EAST HAMPTON WILL REMAIN ON THE GRAND LIST.

- A. A copy of the bill of sale.
- B. A copy of the transfer of title (i.e., receipt from junkyard, trade-in paperwork, donation receipt).
- C. A copy of the original registration issued to the person to whom you sold the vehicle.
- D. A copy of the registration in another state.
- E. Documentation from an insurance company, i.e.; payment for a stolen vehicle, payment for a totaled vehicle, cancellation of coverage due to sale of vehicle.

The Assessor's office may require a combination of additional information or verification of the preceding items, as necessary, for the removal or crediting of a motor vehicle assessment.

#### TRANSFERRED PLATES:

When the registration is transferred to a new or replacement vehicle, the adjustment follows the plate. The over



payment on the July tax bill is applied to the supplemental tax bill in December.

## **Public Works**



Summer work for the Public Works Department is winding down. Filling of potholes, road sweeping, tree work, roadside mowing and gravel road maintenance have been a part of the daily routine. Catch basin cleaning, line painting, and curbing will be completed before adverse weather sets in. Public Works equipment is being repaired and maintained for in season work and being readied for winter use.

Along with our normal road and fleet maintenance operations, the Public Works Department has undertaken several projects throughout the town including pavement shimming work on Mott Hill Road and White Birch Road. Additionally, drainage projects have been undertaken on Edgerton Street, Ridgeview Drive, and Navajo Trail.

Crews from Indus Inc. have completed crack sealing operations on Hurd Park Road, Hog Hill Road, Haddam Neck Road, Carriage Drive and Emily Lane. Crack sealing is an important pavement preservation technique that prevents





water from seeping into the pavement structure causing premature failure.

The Town recycling center is fully open again accepting normal recycling materials. The normal hours of the recycling center are Saturdays 7:30 am to 3:00 pm.

# East Hampton Volunteer Fire Department and the Art of "Rural" Firefighting

At its basic level, the Fire Service defines three distinct firefighting categories, each with their own unique characteristics, tools, equipment and methodologies.

In urban areas, municipal fire departments typically have multiple stations serving specific districts and are staffed by career fire-fighters on a 24/7 basis. These departments utilize equipment geared toward containing and suppressing fires occurring in densely populated neighborhoods and business districts and, most importantly, have a readily available water supply through pressurized hydrant systems.

On the opposite end of the spectrum, wildland firefighting usually involves large scale forest and brush fires that typically consume vast areas of timber and underbrush. Wildland firefighters employ hand tools and heavy equipment to construct fire breaks to stop the progress of these swift-moving fires and, with water supplies not easily accessible, rely on aerial drops of fire retardants and water imported from long distances by helicopter or fixed wing aircraft.

Between these two extremes lies the "WUI" - the "Wildland / Urban Interface" - more commonly described as the "rural" areas of our country. With the US Census Bureau defining "rural" as a locality with less than 500 inhabitants per square mile, East Hampton's population demographics settle within a range of approximately 375-380 per square mile, a decidedly "rural" community.

For the Fire Service, the defining feature that distinguishes rural firefighting from the other categories involves its lifeblood: water supply. In urban areas with hydrants, there's plenty of water nearby; in the wildlands, you have to have somebody else bring it in for you. In rural firefighting, you have to bring the water with you because there are no hydrants installed and aerial bombardments are neither appropriate nor timely.

Rural fire departments, typically staffed by volunteers, rely on tanker trucks to transport water to the scene of a fire where they will feed the pumper trucks for fire suppression. Multiple tankers are usually pressed into



service and a continuous loop is established between a water source (such as Lake Pocotopaug) and the fire scene to maintain a constant flow of water as required. Each tanker will normally make multiple trips to the water source and back until the fire is extinguished.

In East Hampton, the Volunteer Fire Department currently has three tanker trucks, each capable of carrying a minimum of 2000 gallons of water, strategically placed across the town. The Department's protocol requires at least one tanker to initially respond to any potential fire or fire alarm along with at least one engine (pumper). Other apparatus, including additional tankers and perhaps including mutual aid from surrounding departments, are dispatched as the incident dictates.

Unfortunately, two of the Department's three tankers are over twenty years old and have reached the end of their serviceable life. Beginning to spend increasingly more time out-of-service for maintenance, they are to be replaced with two new tankers and will be in service well before the end of the year.

"Water on Wheels", as Fire Chief Greg Voelker describes his tanker force, "is a core competency of our Department, and we spend quite a bit of time training and practicing our tanker operations. As a rule, fire engines only carry a limited supply of water on board and we depend on those tankers to keep those hoses charged and operational; without those tanker resources available when we need them, we can't do our job."

The new tankers will have a capacity to carry 2100 gallons of water per vehicle and will be able to pump between 1000 and 1250 gallons per minute. Manufactured by Pierce, the tankers are built on commercial Freightliner M2 106 4 X 2 chassis, with single rear axles. "We specified the single axles because, at 148 inches long, the tankers will be able to maneuver better through the tight confines of the areas surrounding the lake and other residential spots such as the Poet's or the Indigenous People's sections. When we need water, getting in and out quickly with our tankers is extremely important. They are the perfect fit for our Department and our Town's needs."

The East Hampton Volunteer Fire Department remains a 100% volunteer organization that provides emergency services to our residents. For information on becoming a member, leave a message at Department headquarters (860) 267-2198.





At this writing mask wearing is recommended for all participants regardless of vaccination status. Please note: if you are unsure of status please call the Senior Center for further information.

Virtual programming was established, and the Older Adults saw the need for the interaction with one another and were willing to learn to meet virtually. We offered reassurance phone calls to over 600 people. We developed a 'contactless' volunteer shopping program to help keep people safe. Many volunteers made masks to share with others to help keep people safe. The Senior Center and Community Renewal Team provided weekly drop-off Grab and Go meals. We continued to meet peoples' needs by listening, calling, emailing and providing virtual opportunities. Now, many Older Adults are vaccinated, the Center opened its doors, with certain protocols in place. As the Governor opened the state, we relaxed some of those rules. Now as the transmission rates are increasing, we need to encourage best safe practices. At this time, it is recommended for you to wear your mask indoors in public buildings, regardless of vaccination status. This is to help keep you protected as well as the most vulnerable from the illness.

We are so pleased with the programs & services that have been provided to the Older Adult population we plan to offer more programs to encourage interaction and community involvement. Call the Center for Open Enrollment Events: Medicare's Annual Enrollment period is October 15 through December 7. It is important for all Medicare recipients to check their

plans to make sure that they will be enrolled in the plan that will work best for them. For most people this is the ONLY time during the year that you can change your plan.

If you would like help with checking your Medicare plans, please make an appointment with a Choices Counselor through the East Hampton Senior Center at 860-267-4426. This is a FREE service to anyone in the community on Medicare. You do not have to be 65. The Choices Counselors are trained to provide you with a comprehensive understanding of the Medicare options, so you can make informed decisions regarding your healthcare.

The State of Connecticut offers some additional help for people with low incomes. Your eligibility could also be checked by making an appointment with a counselor. This can be done ANY time during the year, not only during Annual Enrollment.

## **Too Cold in Winter? Too Hot in Summer?** There's a Solution with Weatherization By Enoch Lenge

Earlier this month, New England saw five days of 90 degree-plus heat, the longest June heat wave in nearly a century. That worrying trend not only highlights the importance of reducing greenhouse gas emissions, but is also a reminder to ensure our homes are sufficiently weatherized to keep cool air in during the

Weatherization is the process of making your home better protected against the effects of changing weather. It can involve actions like sealing air leaks, eliminating drafts and adding insulation. These strategies help improve your home's performance and make it more energy efficient. Plus, it can help you save money on your energy bills.

#### Sealing and insulating your home saves both money and energy.

Air can escape, or leak, through your home's envelope, including the outer walls, windows, doors and other openings. Your heating and cooling systems work hard to warm or cool your home, and undetected air leaks and drafts, inadequate insulation or worn out ductwork can cause those HVAC systems to use more energy without doing much to increase the comfort of the home.

And, if your HVAC system is outdated (i.e. hasn't been replaced or repaired in the last fifteen years or so) it may be producing warm or cool air inefficiently. Thus, by the time the air reaches the vents, it may be several degrees off from the starting temperature.

But by implementing weatherization techniques, such as air sealing and new insulation, your HVAC's performance is improved and the desired warm or cool air will stay inside the home, reducing energy use and saving money.

#### Weatherization also increases comfort.

When your home is properly weatherized by sealing leaks and adding insulation, drafts are virtually eliminated, improving the overall comfort of your home. You will notice the temperature you set your thermostat to is maintained more easily. And, if you incorporate

insulation along with air sealing, there will be a denser layer between you and the sounds outside, resulting in a guieter home and reducing the likelihood of ice dams on the roof and eves.

Weatherization also keeps the outside from coming into your home - that includes pollen, dust and other allergens. It also reduces the chance for mold buildup. The temperature around the inside perimeter fluctuates less in a weatherized home, resulting in less moisture buildup during the summer and winter. The result is cleaner, healthier air.

Most homes in the U.S. don't have enough insulation and have significant air leaks. In fact, if you added up all the leaks, holes and gaps in a typical home's envelope, it would be the equivalent of having a window open every day of the year. But when your home's energy performance is improved, it not only makes your home more comfortable and saves money, but the consumption of water, electricity and fossil fuels (i.e. natural gas, coal and oil) are reduced as well. Thus, greenhouse gas emissions - which, of course, contribute to climate change - decrease. By weatherizing your home, you are helping the environment and contributing to emissions reductions that could help stave off future heat waves.
