Town Manager's Corner

Hello East Hampton! Cooler temperatures and shorter days mean winter will soon be upon us.

During the fall and into the winter, the Town is continuing efforts to gain public input on various aspects of Town government. The older adult population of the community was surveyed in September and October about its needs and desires and that survey data will be presented to the Town Council in December. Further, the community provided input to the Parks and Recreation Department regarding needs and desires for that area. A survey is being developed to solicit additional information and it should be available for completion in December and January. The information from these efforts coupled with information received about the library through its survey a year ago will aid the Town as it plans for the future.

Work is ongoing at the High School athletic fields to improve the tennis courts, baseball field, track and soccer field. The project, which is funded with unspent proceeds from the High School renovation project, is progressing well and this season's work will wrap up in December. The overall project will be complete in the spring. The Town has selected an engineering firm to assist it with identifying and developing one or more new water sources for the Town's water system and develop the long-term plans for improving service in and around the Village Center as well as adjoining areas to address water quality and water quantity needs. With new funding sources for infrastructure having been recently approved, Town leadership anticipates the Town is in a unique position to move

appropriate plans forward with significant outside funding.

As I look back a year at the various pieces of pandemic-related information I have been tracking, I notice that our daily infection rate is similar to last year, but two points stand out. First, we are slightly lower this year than last and, second, we are trending toward fewer infections this year. Last year at this time, we were head-

ing into a major spike in infections which lasted until the spring. While we celebrate with family and friends during the holidays, everyone is encouraged to take steps to remain safe and to keep those with whom we celebrate safe as well. The best gift of all will be health in the new year!

We hope the magazine continues to be a great resource for everyone. As always, I encourage everyone to support our local businesses and especially those that sponsor this publication. Conservation-Lake Commission

Late fall is a great time to do improvements to your lake or watershed property in order to have a cleaner Lake Pocotopaug. It is also a time to have your property evaluated and earn a Lake Smart Award.

The East Hampton Conservation & Lake Commission (C&LC) started the "Lake-Smart Award Program" for property owners living on Lake Pocotopaug or in the surrounding watershed. The purpose is to encourage property owners to improve the quality of Lake Pocotopaug by doing projects to prevent infiltration of phosphates, nitrates, pesticides, and other impurities from entering the lake. Those that achieve seven requirements will receive a Lake-Smart Award sign they can display on their property. It is hoped the program will not only improve the quality of the lake but also encourage neighbors to make improvements to their property,



and herbicides? In mowing their lawn do they maintain the level of their lawn at 2 ½-3" and use a mulching blade instead of bagging grass clippings? Do they cover bare soil areas with mulch or plantings? Do they refrain from feeding water fowl and discourage them from coming onto their property? Finally, do they prevent leaves and grass clippings from entering the lake?

Those wishing to be evaluated for the award, should contact: Jeremy Hall of the Parks & Recreation Dept. (860-267-7300 or jhall@easthamptonct.gov) or Jeremy DeCarli of the Planning & Zoning Dept. (860-267-7450 or jdecarli@easthamptonct.gov) or any members of the C&LC. An appointment will be arranged for a C&LC member(s) to visit the owners and help them evaluate their property. If there is a deficiency, owners will be given suggestions on improving their property. If they achieve all the goals, they will receive a Lake-Smart Award. We can all work together to have a cleaner lake.

This is a FREE service to anyone in the community on Medicare. You do not have to be 65. The Choices Counselors

are trained to provide you with a comprehensive understanding of the Medicare options, so you can make informed decisions regarding your healthcare. The State of Connecticut offers some additional help for people with low incomes. Your eligibility could also be checked by making an appointment with a counselor. This can be done ANY time during the year, not only during Annual Enrollment.



What Are They Up to Now???

When residents see firefighters and fire apparatus around town in non-emergency situations, they are often curious (and sometimes skeptical) about the intentions, motivations and purposes of these varied activities. Firefighters may be observed placing and climbing ladders to the roof of a school building on a Sunday morning, or operating a truck parked by the side of a road pushing a geyser of water out of the deck gun on a Wednesday evening, or perhaps driving by the same place, in the same truck, forward and backward, over and over again on a Thursday night.



Regardless of the specific activity, they always seem to generate some interesting calls to the firehouse:

"I see fire trucks at the high school; can we still play tennis???"

"Why are you guys spraying water back into the Cranberry Bog???"

"Don't you guys have better things to do than waste the town's diesel fuel???"

In reality, these observable activities are all training exercises designed to introduce and reinforce firefighting skills that are essential to executing safe and effective emergency operations. Firefighters need to know how

natural sources across the town for water supply. Water is drafted from these natural sources by fire apparatus either directly through suction hoses or through piping systems ("dry hydrants") that need to be tested and metered for adequate flow on a regular basis. One of the department's 37 dry hydrants is located at the Cranberry Bog...

Fire apparatus is big, heavy, and expensive and the EHVFD has a rigid and demanding process for training the driver-operators permitted to handle its vehicles. Hours of on-the-road practice with a certified instructor is required before the firefighter becomes eligible to undergo a practical examination

under the auspices of the Department of Motor Vehicles. Sometimes, several candidates are being trained at the same time, so that's why people may see the same truck go by the same place several times within in a short period.

The photos shown were taken on a

recent Sunday morning and serve to illustrate the powers of perception. The casual observer will note that one photo shows three young guys holding a fire hose and the other photo shows two old guys playing with a truck. This scenario generated two

comments from passers-by: "Are you trying to drown Walnut Avenue?" and "You guys are blocking traffic for nothing..."

The reality: the first photo is of three 15-year-old EHVFD Junior Division firefighters being instructed on nozzle operation and hose advancement by one of the Junior Division Advisors and a past Deputy Fire Chief. This was the first time two of those three Juniors had ever operated a nozzle or handled a charged hose line. The other photo shows two "mature" firefighters training with a new style Tanker on drafting from a fast-flowing water source while simultaneously pumping water to the engine shown in the background. The Department is scheduled to receive two new tankers of similar configuration shortly whose operation differs significantly from the tankers currently in service. Not shown are the operator of the Engine receiving refresher pump training or the probationary firefighter training on operating the deck gun.

From Fire Chief Greg Voelker: "We realize that sometimes our training sessions can be misinterpreted by some and can cause some inconvenience to others. We try to limit the impact to the public as best we can, but it is important that we train in situations that are as realistic as possible and under conditions that are conducive to achieving our goals. We encourage people to ask questions about what we do, and we are always ready to respond."



and where to properly deploy ladders for search and rescue, and also to gain access to roofs for ventilation — so they practice at the school buildings.

Lacking a hydrant system, East Hampton Volunteer firefighters rely on a network of

The Town of East Hampton recently purchased a Variable Message Sign (VMS) which the Department is putting to good use. We have used it to notify motorists to slow down and be aware of pedestrians in crosswalks, obey the speed limits, don't drink and drive, don't text and drive and don't forget to vote on November 2nd.

As the colder weather approaches, so does the possibility of snow and ice on our roadways. Please allow extra driving time during inclement weather and allow extra space between the car in front of you as your stopping distance is increased when the roads are covered with snow and ice. LEGAL NOTICE

In accordance with Connecticut General Statute 12-40, all persons who are liable to pay taxes on tangible personal property belonging to them on October 1, 2021 are hereby notified that they must file a declaration of their personal property on or before November 1, 2021, with the Assessor, or be subject to an estimated assessment and the statutory 25% penalty. Various exemptions are explained on the declaration and available if filed on time.

Personal property includes, but is not limited to, non-CT registered motor vehicles, unregistered motor vehicles (including junk autos), campers, all business machinery, equipment, tools, commercial furniture and fixtures.

No declaration is required for motor vehicles registered in east hampton, ct

No declaration is required for real estate

The filing deadlines for various exemptions and classifications are as follows:

PUBLIC ACT 490

All applications for classification of farm or forestland must be received by October 31, 2021.

VETERANS

Veterans claiming disability exemption must submit proof from the Veterans Administration. PA 85-573 allows veterans an additional exemption if their income is within the approved limits. This application must be filed by October 1 bi-annually.

DISABILITY

Persons totally disabled receiving SSD benefits may be eligible for a \$1000 property exemption. Proof of award and application must be submitted by January 31, 2022.

HOMEOWNERS & TOTALLY DISABLED

Residents 65 years of age or totally disabled may be eligible for a tax credit on real estate; income guidelines apply and are adjusted each year. You must request an application in February 2022 and file it on or before May 15, 2022.

RENTERS REBATE

Residents 65 years of age or totally disabled may be eligible for a rent rebate under CT State law; income guidelines apply and are adjusted each year. Applications will be available April 1, 2022 and must be filed on or before October 1, 2022 with the Assessor's Office.

The Assessor's Office is open to receive the above lists and applications Monday, Wednesday, Thursday 8:00 am to 4:00 pm, Tuesday 8:00 am to 6:30 pm and Friday 8:00 am to 12:30 pm.

Public Works Department

As the 2021 construction season winds down, winter preparation work for the Public Works Department is in full swing. Department staff has begun to prepare and calibrate winter maintenance equipment to ensure it is ready when needed

throughout the winter season. In the upcoming weeks, additional winter preparations will include filling potholes, performing gravel road maintenance, tree work and roadside ditch clearing.



This past construction season has been very busy and successful. Along with the normal road and fleet maintenance operations, the Public Works Department has completed nearly 4.5 miles of pavement surface restoration, along with a

> major drainage project on Edgerton Street in preparation for reconstruction and paving this coming spring. The Department also completed some other smaller drainage projects at Ridgeview Drive and Navajo Trail. Additionally, crews from Indus Inc.

have completed crack sealing operations on Hog Hill Road, Hurd Park Road, Haddam Neck Road, Carriage Drive and Emily

Lane. Crack sealing is an important

pavement preservation technique that prevents water from seeping into the pavement structure causing premature failure.

The Town Recycling Center is fully open and accepting normal recycling materials, brush, and leaves. The hours of the recycling center are Saturdays 7:30 am to 3:00 pm.

With winter knocking at our doorstep, the Public Works department would also like to ask all residents for their assistance in keeping all Town roads/rights-of-way clear of obstructions and vehicles during snow clearing operations. Keeping these areas clear greatly speeds our efforts and enables the department to get roads clear for motorists as quickly as possible. Garbage and recycling carts/containers should be kept behind the curb/edge of road, and alternate off-street parking locations should be utilized during snow removal operations.

If there are questions, please call the Public Works Department, Monday through Friday, 8:00 am to 3:30 pm at 860-267-4747.

Additionally, residents should not deposit

snow onto any Town road or property.

Land Use Department

The Land Use Department acquired grant funding to hire a summer intern during the 2021 summer. With the help of a recent graduate from the Planning Program at Central CT State University, the department conducted public meetings and forums and developed a Village Center Plan. The plan focuses on bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure improvements for the Village Center in order to make the area more walkable, bikeable, and enjoyable for residents and visitors alike. There were several well attended meetings held with business owners, property owners, and the community as a whole. Recommendations include, but are not limited to, changing the configuration of sidewalks and intersections to better facilitate pedestrian traffic and improve safety, increase signage to better point

patrons toward businesses, and more trash cans, benches, and other amenities. For those interested, the entire plan is available on the Land Use Department webpage.

The Planning and Zoning Commission, along with the Economic Development Commission held several workshops during the summer months to draft new proposed Home-Based Business regulations, which for the first time since 1990, would legally allow residents to operate certain small businesses from their home. As drafted, certain businesses would not require any permitting and would be allowed to operate "as-of-right." Others would require approval from the Land Use Office prior to beginning operation. A final draft was sent to the Planning and Zoning Commission for adoption. It is anticipated that a Public Hearing will

open at their January 5, 2022 meeting to hear public comment on the proposal. This is a big step in aligning our regulations with all of our neighboring towns when it comes to allowing certain types of businesses to operate out of homes.

Several new businesses were approved over the summer months, including a new brewery at 201 West High Street, a new indoor storage facility at the old Sports on 66 facility, and a new gas station next to Cheers Package Store.

Finally, it is with a heavy heart that we say goodbye to Christine Castonguay, our long time Zoning Technician, after a courageous health battle. Christine served the public with a smile and brought joy to our office every day. She will be sorely missed.



Program Refund Policy

If you are unable to attend a program you have registered for, please contact us. You must contact us 7 days before a program starts to receive a 100% refund. Cancelations inside of 7 days

will receive a 50% refund or be issued an account credit for another activity. After the program starts no refunds will be issued. Our ability to refund money for trip cancellations depends on our contractual agreement with the travel companies.

Tips from the East Hampton Fire Marshal

PICKING THE TREE

• Choose a tree with fresh, green needles that do not fall off when touched.

PLACING THE TREE

- Before placing the tree in the stand, cut 2" from the base of the trunk.
- Make sure the tree is at least three feet away from any heat source, like fireplaces, radiators, candles, heat vents or lights.
- Make sure the tree is not blocking an exit.
- Add water to the tree stand. Be sure to add water daily.

LIGHTING THE TREE

- Use lights that are listed by a qualified testing laboratory. Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect
- Never use lit candles to decorate the tree.
- Always turn off Christmas tree lights before leaving home or going to bed.

SCSU Baseball Coach Tim Shea - From a baseball dream to a baseball dream job...

Like for so many kids, Tim Shea had the dream - the lure of being a major league baseball player. While the West Haven Little Leaguer didn't get to the MLB, he's found his baseball


home as head baseball coach at Southern Connecticut State University.

SOME THINGS ARE JUST MEANT TO BE....

Coach Shea and SCSU simply go together. But SCSU was never in the plans. Shea was recruited by UCONN as a student athlete – following in his big brother's footsteps. It was the Big East, with annual College World Series opportunities. The perfect fit.

"I left before the first workout," recounts Shea. Home sick and feeling lost on a large campus, Shea was thinking UNH. Then, Shea experienced one of the most influential conversations of his life. Two simple questions from Joe Tonelli, Shea's former athletic director at Notre Dame HS and assistant coach at UNH. 'Why do you want to go to UNH?' Shea's simple answer – great baseball program.

'What do you want to study and what profession do you want after playing?' After some thought Shea's reply was possibly a teacher and a coach. Shea recalls an unforgettable response. "Then why the hell do you want to go to UNH? Right up the road is Southern. They have exactly what you are looking for!"



Shea blossomed as a SCSU student athlete. The two-year captain led the nation in doubles per game in 1987, his senior year. He was team MVP in 1985 and Second-Team All-Conference in 1986. He secured a degree in Special Education, a teaching job and coached football and baseball at NDHS before arriving back at SCSU in 1991 as an assistant and becoming head coach in 2001. Over his 32year tenure coaching the Owls, there are six NCAA Tournament appearances and two NCAA World Series berths. Shea is a three-time Northeast 10 Conference Coach of the Year and a three-time Northeast Regional Coach of the Year. He's had 8 seasons of 30 or more wins. On May 1, 2019 he captured his 467th victory to become the winningest coach in program history.

KEYS TO SUCCESS

While there are so many analytics (spin ratios, launch angles), Shea trusts his eyes when determining whether a player has what it takes or not. Along with skill set, Shea looks for intangibles like being willing to sacrifice, accountability, dedication, determination and mental toughness. From there, he gets to know his players and what makes them tick. "The more you know a player, the better suited you are to motivate them and help them reach their full potential," he explains. Having effective practices requires strong time management skills. Structure and discipline are necessary so that players respond as expected in tough situations.

The players hold a special place in Shea's heart, not just accomplishments on the field but also in their professional and family lives. Many are married, have children. They are police officer, firemen, teachers, coaches, businessmen, and even a Navy Seal. "I'm so proud of each and every one of them," Shea underscores.



THE LOVE OF BASEBALL / FAMILY

Shea's love of baseball derives from his family. His mother and father encouraged him to play sports. "My Dad was not only the absolute best father one could ask for, he was also the best coach," reflects Shea. Shea tagged along with his brother to play in sand lot games. Playing baseball with the older kids showed Shea that he could compete.

Family is still central to Shea - from walking the dog with his wife, golfing with his son, playing dominoes with his wife, mother, mother and father-in-law ... or, his favorite, playing with his two granddaughters. And there's that memorable moment in his coaching career. "Slapping my son TJ's hands as he rounded third base after hitting a game tying 3-run homerun at the College World Series," he relates. "And then, later that evening, sharing the stage with him at the post-game conference and hear him deflect all the praise for his performance to the play and comradery of his teammates. I was not just a proud coach but also a proud father. It doesn't get any better than that!"

WHAT KEEPS HIM GOING?

There are two things. "One is my players," Shea says. "I just love that I am able to be a small part of their lives. Helping them to reach their full potential on and off the field. The second thing that keeps me going is the chase. I tell my players every day: 'Chase perfection to catch excellence.' I love the chase, the process, the journey. Trying to get better every day so that at the end of a season something magical might happen."

Education Initiatives in Connecticut

Across the state of Connecticut, administrators, teachers and students are well underway with their lesson plans for the 2021 school year. While educators are accustomed to teaching their students language arts, history, math and science, another important discussion to have with younger generations in the classroom is energy efficiency. 
ment in the energy efficiency industry.
