SUBJECT: Town Manager's Report

The following information includes follow up from general items that were discussed at previous Council meetings as well as updates of a general nature from the departments. The items are organized by department and are intended to provide information on activities currently being undertaken by the Town's departments and those matters that are upcoming. Not all departments will be represented in each Report.

Collector's Office

➤ A reminder that the tax sale is scheduled for June 14 at 10:00am. The list of unpaid properties is down to eleven properties from an original list of approximately 100 properties that were severely delinquent on either property taxes or sewer fees or, in some cases, both. Staff anticipates that some additional properties will pay their balances prior to the sale. Any remaining properties will be subject to auction on Tuesday. Any property sold through the auction will be subject to a six month waiting period during which the original owner is able to redeem the property through payment of the amounts due. The original list of over 100 properties accounted for approximately \$1.4 million in amounts due to the Town. Less than \$500,000 remains delinquent.

Library

- The Library Director met several members of the community at the "meet and greet" on June 1 and continues to get acquainted with the community. Residents and others are encouraged to stop by the Library and introduce themselves.
- Patrons were able to enjoy four chicks from the eggs that were incubated in the Library. Special thanks were sent to Hatch the Chicken, the farm from which the eggs/chicks came, for the cheeping Library chicks, named by patron suggestions: Lil' Peeps, Aidan, Cluck Norris, and Fireball Booyah! After spending some time at the Library, they have returned to the farm.
- There are just a few copies left of the June Book Club selection and those interested are encouraged pick one up and join on Tuesday, June 21 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *The Twelve Lives of Samuel Hawley* by Hannah Tinti. Parks and Recreation

- Summer staff at Sears Park have started working the weekend schedule and will begin weekday schedules June 17.
- The Park and Recreation Advisory Board started to discuss developing a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) that would be used to select a professional service firm to design a Master Plan for the Town-owned land between Memorial School and the Air Line Trail. Development of this plan would outline use of this land purchased by the Town several years ago and responds to the feedback from the recent Needs Analysis to identify more opportunities for recreation in the community. The RFQ document is expected to be presented to the Town Council in the Fall for approval.

- The Earmark Grant application through Representative Cortney's office has passed its initial approval phase of funding for the \$1.4 million dollar construction project to develop the 1200-foot section of the Air Line Trail behind Public Works west of the Rt 66/Rt 16 intersection. The grant has been moved on to the Appropriations Committee. If approved by the Appropriations Committee, the grant will make its way to the President for final signature before funds are released to the Town. Staff is working with CT DEEP and CT DOT as partners in the project and final award is expected by end of the calendar year.
- ➤ The Department continues to see great response to programs being offered with 85% of the 40 programs on our website reaching full capacity. Sears Park Summer Camp will start running on June 20.

Police

- With the recent school shooting in Uvalde, Texas, the Department has spent additional time visiting all the schools during the day, especially during morning arrival and afternoon dismissal.
- Officer DeRoehn is completing a week-long Peer Support Training course, which is designed to teach officers to return to their agency and implement a Peer Support Program. Officer wellness is an extremely important focus for this Department as well as others, especially as Officers deal with the aftermath of the COVID 19 Pandemic, changes in our communities and the stressors and changes placed on agencies as a result of recent legislative changes including the Police Accountability bill.
- Officer Vincent Garofalo is doing very well in the Police Academy, and he is scheduled to graduate on July 28. Upon graduation, he will complete a 16 week Field Training and Evaluation Program (FTEP) in East Hampton where he will be assigned to ride with another Officer who will provide additional training and evaluate the new Officer's performance. If everything goes well, Officer Garofalo will be on his own sometime during the first week of November.
- > The Department reports that its Officers did not administer Narcan during the month of May.

Public Works

The Edgerton Street Sidewalk project should be completed early the week of June 13. Curbing installation and turf establishment is well under way and nearing completion with Hydroseeding to be completed late next week or early the following week. Overall, the project included replacement of nearly the entire storm sewer system, reclaiming and repaving of the road, selected sidewalk replacement, curbing and turf restoration and was completed with a combination of Town forces and contractors.

- Nearly all gravel roads have been regraded and compacted with only a few of the shorter roads still left to be addressed. This process will continue until all of the roads have been addressed.
- The Town's catch basin cleaning contractor has completed the spring round of cleaning and has cleaned nearly 650 catch basins in town, including all of those in the lake watershed and also in several other areas in town that have not been addressed recently.
- ➤ Staff from Public Works are scheduled to mobilize to 82 Main Street at the end of next week (week of June 13) to begin the drainage pipe replacement project there. Some other drainage projects in the schedule for this summer are Old Marlborough Road, Forest Street, Old Middletown Avenue, Knowles Road, and Whippoorwill Hollow Road.

WPCA

- ➢ Joint Facilities and staff at the wastewater plant are continuing to respond to a situation and an OSHA Complaint that was made by an employee earlier this year. In short, a mistake was made during a project to rewire a pump at the plant and proper procedure was not followed to prevent the pump from being operated prior to completion of the project using the "lock out, tag out" protocol. Management staff at the facility began responding to the employee concern when it was raised and was in process of addressing the situation when the OSHA investigator arrived. Nevertheless, the OSHA investigation was completed, and a report and four related citations were received last week. None of the citations related to the actual electrical work. All related to the failure to follow procedure and provide timely, appropriate training. Staff has reached out to Connecticut OSHA to discuss the matter and the Joint Facilities response, which involved immediate review and training/retraining on the procedure. Connecticut OSHA has imposed just under \$8,000 in fines.
- Water main flushing has begun and will be occurring in the Village Center and Royal Oaks water systems in the next two weeks. Residents in those areas should watch for notices posted in the area regarding flushing as this work, which is intended to help clear sediment from the lines and ensure water circulation, does disturb iron and other sediments in the pipes that will remain suspended for a period of time.

Youth and Family Services

The Department continues to be a resource to residents who need assistance for energy or home fuel, food and domestic water connecting these residents to several different government and private programs. The Department is also monitoring families with housing issues who are

at risk for possible eviction and is actively working with a household that was relocated from their rental unit due to conditions.

- On Monday, June 6, Youth Services held the online presentation titled, "The Dangers of Today's Marijuana." A link to the recording of this powerful presentation is available on the Youth and Family Services Facebook page and will remain active and accessible for 30 days.
- As a result of the overwhelming generosity of the M. Jones Fund at the Community Foundation of Middlesex County, Youth Services was recently surprised to learn we were a recipient of a grant in the amount of \$1,500. These funds will be used entirely on youth programming and initiatives.
- The Department reminds the community's young people of the first annual photography contest being sponsored by Youth Services. Staff will be collecting black and white submissions throughout the summer depicting the youths' view of the Town. It is anticipated that the submissions will be displayed in businesses around the community and awards will be giving out for first, second, and third place, including Amazon gift cards in the following amounts: \$150, \$75, and \$50.

Town Manager/Other

The Town's officially reported COVID rates are, once again, on the decline. In the most recent reporting, although the Town remains at the "Red Alert" level and is seeing about three reported cases per day or a rate of 24.6 daily cases per 100,000 population, Middlesex County is at a Medium Community Level and all of Connecticut is either Medium or Low. Residents are encouraged to maintain safe habits to avoid spreading or suffering severe effects of any illness like staying home when sick, wearing masks when it is appropriate, and staying up to date on vaccines.

- Hatch the Chicken was a huge draw generating patron engagement, including following the
 progress of baby chicks Aidan, Cluck Norris, Fireball Booyah, and Lil Peeps. The chicks' names
 were suggested by library patrons. (Welcoming & Vibrant)
- Public computer use has increased 40% throughout 2022, the library had over 700 program attendees in the month of May, and welcomed just under 4,000 visitors for the month. (Informative & Collaborative), (Welcoming & Vibrant)



Department Reports

Administration:

This section contains general updates and news about library administration.

- New Library Director Tim Kellogg had initial meetings with the Friends of the Library, Library Advisory Board, Town Department Heads, Town Manager, and Town Council. There will be a meet and greet with Tim on Wednesday, June 1 at 5 PM.
- The EHPD was called on 5/11 to address a loitering and public drinking issue on library grounds.
- Budget tracking and spending plans for the remainder of the fiscal year are underway.
- All library staff completed the required sexual harassment training by 5/25.
- Tim was interviewed for the Rivereast News.
- The Public Service Associate position opening was posted on 5/16 and is accepting applicants through 6/3 (or until filled).
- The ARPA Grant final report to the CT State Library was completed and approved.
- A new scheduling platform was implemented for staff schedules and room reservations, due to technical issues with the former schedules.

Children's Department:

This section contains general updates and news about the Children's Department.

- The children's department will be visiting Memorial and Center School classrooms the first week of June to inform students about the upcoming Summer Reading Program. During their monthly outreach visits, local preschools and childcare centers will also receive materials about the program for children to take home.
- Passive programs such as scavenger hunts and interactive bulletin boards continue to bring foot traffic to the children's room and will remain in place.
- The STEMtastic Veterinary Medicine program on May 4th was very well attended. Participants showed a strong interest in and enthusiasm for STEM topics, which will continue to be a focus of children's programming.
- Wednesday storytimes will resume beginning June 1st with a new format. Toddler Time will take
 place at 10:15am and be geared towards children 18 months-3 years old, and Stories and Songs
 will take place at 11:15am and be geared towards children ages 3-5 years old. Monday and
 Thursday storytimes will resume beginning June 27th and will take place outdoors throughout
 the summer.

Adult / Young Adult Department:
